

While light pruning can be done on any tree, any time of year, anything more than removing the dead wood can potentially harm your tree if it's not the right season. You can always take down branches broken in winter storms, but you should wait until the coldest part of winter has passed to do any major work. Removing to improving the health of your growing tree. Thinning out your tree allows for more air and light to get in, thus enhancing its strength, shape, and overall condition.

Spring Tree Pruning by Type

The best time to prune your tree will depend on when it will start to bloom. If your tree starts to flower after midsummer, then spring is the best time to trim. Trees that typically bloom in the winter, spring, or early fall should be pruned soon after the flowers have faded. Use the timeline below to help decide when you should start pruning some common trees and shrubs.

Early spring: Apple, cherry, peach, plum, and trumpet vine

Spring: Virginia creeper, wisteria, rose, and clematis

When budding begins: Rose of Sharon After flowering: Flowering dogwood, forsythia, lilac, rhododendron, and climbing rose

Proper Tree Pruning Tips

There are certain techniques to keep in

Improper pruning can lead to weak, hollowed trunks, or even rot and decay entering the healthy tissues of the tree. Follow these tips for the best treetrimming results:

- Remove dead or dying branches
- Remove limbs that rub together
- Trim limbs that grow towards the center of the tree
- Eliminate narrow, V-shaped angles
- Cut close to the trunk, bud, or branch
- Do not leave stubs in branches or the trunk
- When in doubt, enlist the help of a tree care specialist.

But Spring Clean Up would not happen without the many community advocate organizations that provide the volunteers to staff the collection sites.

Spring Clean Up is for the disposal of bulky or difficult to dispose of items such as chairs, couches, appliances, and tires.



Spring Clean Up is not a disposal program for regular household garbage (putrescible waste) for which collection is provided weekly. Spring Clean Up also offers the opportunity to dispose of large limbs and brush that would be difficult to dispose of using the City's weekly yard waste collection.

Not every Spring Clean Up site will collect all materials. Appliances, tires, and lead acid batteries will only be collected at one designated site each Clean Up Saturday.

Collection sites will have vouchers available for disposal of tree limbs and brush on Clean Up Saturdays. Spring Clean Up is open to all Omaha residents. People utilizing a

be a dues paying member of the sponsoring organization, nor do they have to pay any fees what so ever to use a Spring Clean Up site, or the tree Environmental Quality (NDEQ) has limb and brush disposal vouchers.

Examples of Accepted/Common Items (NOT a comprehensive list)

- Furniture (couches, chairs, mattresses, etc.)
- Carpet
- Auto parts
- Tires and lead-acid batteries (at designated locations)
- Appliances (at designated locations)
- Swing sets
- Bicycles and tricycles
- Lumber
- Drywall
- Empty cans, pails, and buckets
- Railroad Ties must be cut into 1 foot pieces for disposal (no site will accept full-size railroad ties)

Prohibited Items (this is not a Under the Sink location on comprehensive list)

- Rocks and concrete
- Household garbage (putrescible waste) – put out with your normal trash collection.



- animal bedding
- Full-size railroad ties



Parasite prevention as we get in to the warm season! **Protect Your Pet(s)**

Puppies and kittens are especially vulnerable to parasites. Unfortunately, some of these parasites are dangerous to peopleespecially children. As pets are increasingly present as part of the family unit, parasite control becomes more important.

Know the facts: Don't expose your children! Keep your pets on parasite preventatives year-round!

- Hookworms and roundworms can be harbored by your dog or cat and transmitted to children who are living in homes with pets. In some cases these parasites can cause blindness in humans. It is thought that 30% to 50% of dogs and cats carry gastrointestinal (GI) parasites and that 1 to 3 million people in the U.S. have infections from the same parasites carried by pets. Children, elderly a n d immunocompromised people are at high risk.
- Dogs get infected with hookworms and roundworms by walking places where other dogs roundworm eggs and hookworm larvae end up on your dog's feet. Your dog then licks his feet and infects him or herself with these GI and tick control all year.

parasites. Three weeks later, your dog is shedding hookworm eggs and larvae from his GI tract. If your dog licks his anus and then licks your child, or if your child pets your dog, he or she can become infected with these parasites.

- Dogs can get ticks that spread Lyme disease, anaplasmosis, Rocky Mountain spotted fever, ehrlichiosis, and tularemia, which can affect people if the ticks detach from the dog and attach themselves to your child. This could be a risk factor for your children if the family dog or cat sleeps in their bed.
- Cats get infected with hookworms and tapeworms by hunting prey. Even if your cat lives indoors, the ingestion of one house mouse can expose your cat to GI parasites. Cats with a flea infestation can spread cat scratch fever to children, elderly people, or immunocompromised (AIDS, cancer patients, organ transplant recipients) people.

Spreading Parasites to Your Children?

Keep your dog on monthly have defecated. The microscopic heartworm preventative all year. This medication helps to prevent hookworms and roundworms in your dog. Keep your dog on topical flea



Scoop the yard where your dog defecates at least weekly, ideally daily, as worm eggs and larvae are found in stool and can contaminate the environment.

- Bring your pet's stool sample to your veterinarian at least twice per year and ideally four times per year. You do not have to bring your pet into the veterinary hospital for this service. The stool should be fresh. Many veterinarians will provide a special cup that allows specimen collection without touching the stool.
- Keep your cat on heartworm prevention once per month all year. This medication eliminates How Can You Prevent the Risk of hookworms that could be potentially spread to humans in the household. It also kills fleas, which can be culprits in spreading cat scratch disease (cat scratch fever).
 - Teach your children to wash their hands before eating, especially if they have recently handled their pet.

The illustrations were done by Cayden's uncle, Benjamin V. Horn, who lives in Berlin, Germany.


In case you missed it, an Armbrust Acres Cayden's mom and dad helped with the resident was featured in the Omaha World publishing and final editing of the book.


